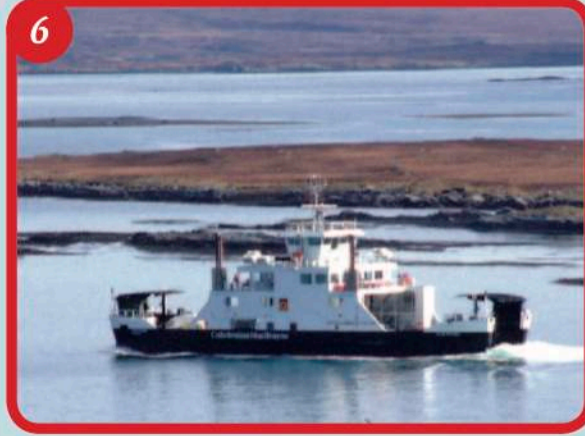
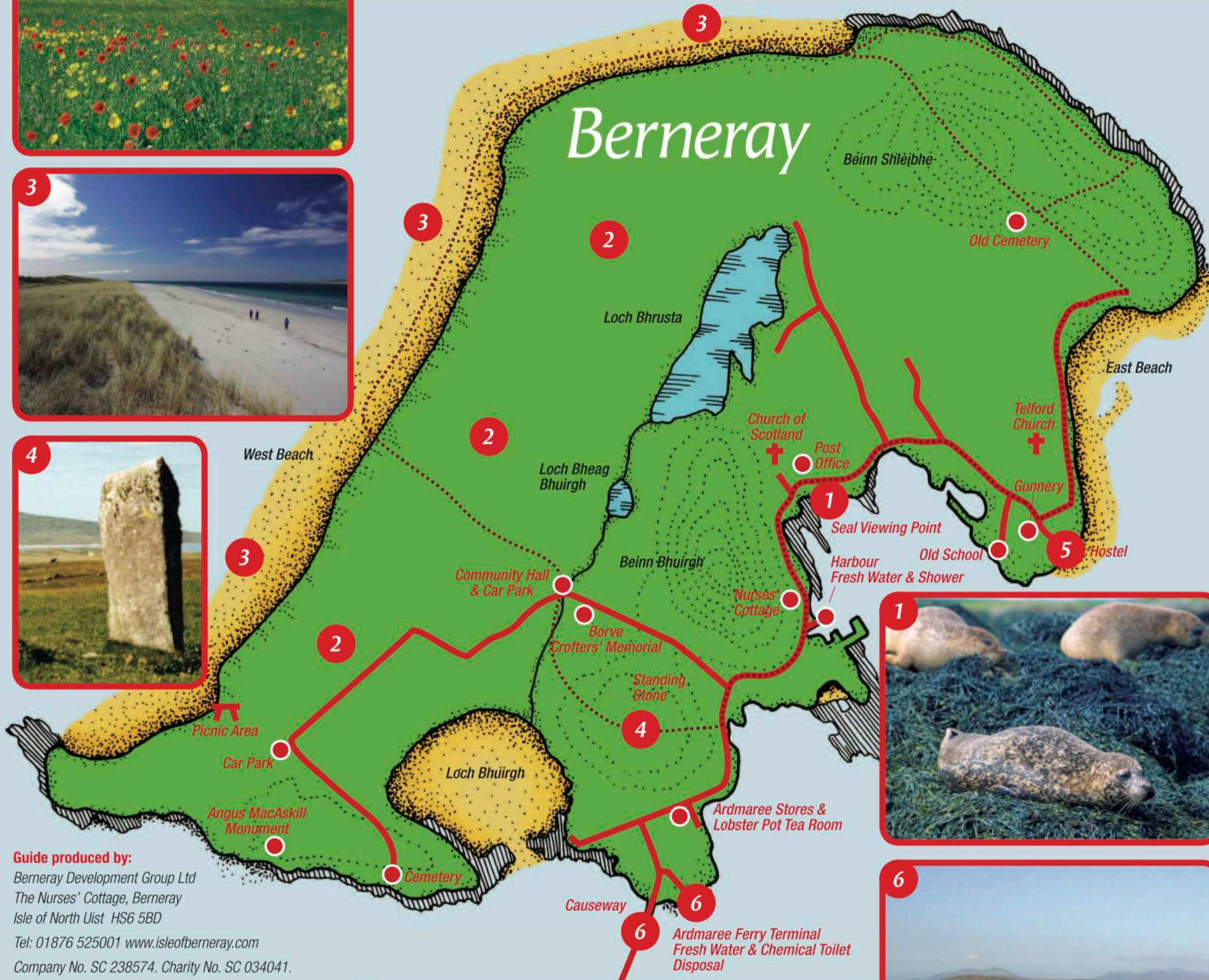

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- 1 Seals and Otters** – The seal colony in Bays Loch is a popular attraction for visitors. Watch the seals displaying at high tide and hauling out on the rocks for a rest at low tide. If you're lucky you may also see an otter on one of the beaches or fishing nearby.
  - 2 The Machair** – Every year in early summer, the *machair* on Berneray's west side is ablaze with beautiful flowers – a riot of colour comprising orchids and many other species and providing a unique habitat for butterflies, bees and other insects.
  - 3 West Beach** – Berneray's famed west beach is possibly the most beautiful in the whole of the Hebrides. Three miles of pristine white sand, washed by the clear waters of the Atlantic, make this an awe-inspiring place to visit at any time of the year.
  - 4 Hill of the Graveyard (Beinn a'Chlaidh)** – a standing stone eight feet above ground and eight feet below, formerly encircled by a ring of boulders – one of a number of interesting Neolithic sites in and around Berneray.
  - 5 The Gatliff Trust Hostel** – a superb example of two restored traditional thatched blackhouses. A unique place to stay in a stunning location at the east beach (*tràigh Bheasdaire*).
  - 6 Berneray Causeway/Ferry** – makes access easy from North Uist in all weathers and at all states of the tide. The Harris ferry goes from the Berneray end of the causeway.
- **Waymarked Walk** – around 7.5 miles easy walking over varied terrain.
